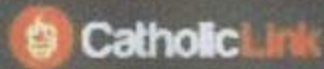


THE SIGNIFICANCE OF THE LITURGICAL COLORS

Brief History of the Mass

- ◊ The Mass was instituted by Jesus at the Last Supper
- ◊ Before the Last Supper, Jesus performs the miracles of the multiplication of fishes and loaves....the food and drink of life that will never run out
- ◊ At the last supper Jesus tells us that when we celebrate the Eucharist....we eat his body and drink his blood.
- ◊ We are instructed " Do this in remembrance of me"
- ◊ Jesus tells us his body and blood will be given for us for the forgiveness of sins
