Advent - Make Ready the Way of the Lord

Opening Prayer – Hail, Holy Queen

Hail, Holy Queen, Mother of mercy, our life, our sweetness and our hope. To thee do we cry, poor banished children of Eve. To thee do we send up our sighs, mourning and weeping in this valley of tears. Turn then, most gracious advocate, thine eyes of mercy towards us. And after this our exile, show unto us the blessed Fruit of thy womb, Jesus. O clement O loving, O sweet Virgin Mary. Pray for us, o Holy Mother of God, that we may be made worth of the promises of Christ. Amen.

Read the Advent Gospel Reflections Introduction. – Listen to "Oh come Oh come Emmanuel"

Reflection: Reminds us of the "Hail Holy Queen" prayer and how Jesus conquered death in the silent darkness of Holy Saturday.

In the Roman rite, the O Antiphons (The Great Advent Antiphons or Great Os) are sung or recited for the Magnificat at Vespers from 17 December to 23 December. Also, used as the Gospel Acclamations. Each text, in the original Latin, begins with the vocative particle "O". Each antiphon is a title of Christ, one of his attributes mentioned in Scripture. Since each antiphon is short, it is helpful to spend time reading it each day, pondering it and praying it meditatively throughout the day as a way to make immediate spiritual preparation for Christmas.

- 17 December: O Sapientia (O Wisdom), Isaiah 11:2–3; 28:29
- 18 December: O Adonai (O Lord/Leader of the House of Israel), Isaiah 11:4–5; 33:22
- 19 December: O Radix Jesse (O Root of Jesse), Isaiah 1:1; 11:10
- 20 December: O Clavis David (O Key of David), Isaiah 9:6; 22:22
- 21 December: O Oriens (O Rising Sun/Morning star) Isaiah 9:1
- 22 December: O Rex Gentium (O King of the Nations), Isaiah 9:5; 2:4
- 23 December: O Emmanuel (God with us, Isaiah 7:14

The first letters of the titles, from last to first, appear to form a Latin acrostic, *Ero cras*, meaning 'Tomorrow, I will be [there]'. This is formed from the first letter of each title Emmanuel, Rex, Oriens, Clavis, Radix, Adonai, Sapientia.

What is Advent?

Advent – Latin Adventus for "to come to" and in Greek Parousia. Korban is sacrifice in Hebrew, which means "to draw close to". The mass is a Thanksgiving sacrifice to draw us close to God.

"The whole reason for Advent is the mercy of the Eternal Father towards you and me. If you can, spend five minutes a day saying, "Lord, I can't wait until you come." – Mother Angelica

It is the first of the 6 seasons of the Church's liturgical year (Mystery of Christ unfolded through the cycle of year) that begins a new Church Year. These liturgical seasons call us to live Christ's mystery in our own lives. Liturgy means the action of the work of the people.

Reflection: Advent takes place in the Winter season. We are in the dessert in darkness. We are in exile. We are the Church Militant in battle. We are bearing our crosses with Christ to win souls. In a way, we are always in this season while on Earth, because we are always preparing for the Lord to be a part of our heart and mind every day. We are the Pilgrim Church on Earth. We are part of a parish, which in Greek is parokein, which means traveler or wanderer or pilgrim.

It is a time of the Church **waiting** with expectation, a time of **hope** and **anticipation**. Israel waited for centuries for the fulfillment of countless Old Testament prophecies. We also wait for our savior to come again at the End Times and in the Eucharist daily.

In Advent we **fast** and make **sacrifices** for God like giving of our Time, Talent, and Treasure. We spend more time in prayer. It is penitential time to pursue deeper conversion by receiving God's Mercy in the sacrament of confession. The penance of Advent prepares us for the joy of Christmas.

We are to **prepare a Way** a **Highway** for the Lord in our lives, so he can come directly into our hearts (prepare the manager of our hearts) without any obstacles. God says before his coming that he will level the mountains (Our egos/Pride/Sin) and lift up the Lowly (Poor and Poor in Spirt/Humble), so our path is smooth and straight.

We are to empty ourselves like the jars of Cana, so we can be filled with the wine of the Holy Spirit. Originated as a 40 day fast in preparation of Christmas. It is a way for the Spirit to control the flesh not the other way around.

Reflection: Advent is should remind us of our quiet reflection on our ride to Mass and as we enter Church and the Penitential Act as part of the Introductory Rite prior to the liturgy of the word. We do this to prepare ourselves for the sacred mysteries. We begin preparing for mass before we get to church. First, we are called to mass and then we respond. Also, Advent should remind us of the time of silence and prayer before Faith and Love is born in the heart of a disciple.

When is Advent?

Advent begins with Sunday after the feast of Saint Andrew and ends the evening mass for the Vigil of Christmas.

11/30 – Feast Day of St. Andrew

12/1 – 1 Sunday of Advent, Year C Begins (Focuses on Luke)

12/6 – Saint Nicholas Day

12/8 - 2nd Sunday of Advent

12/9- Solemnity of the Immaculate Conception (Patron Saint of the United States) of the Blessed Virgin Mary (Holy Day of obligation)

12/12 - Our Lady of Guadalupe

12/15 – 3rd Sunday of Advent, Gaudete (Rejoice) Sunday

12/18 – Advent Penance Service at St. Madeleine, 7 p.m.

12/20 - Rorate Caeli Mass at St. Madeleine at 7 p.m.

12/22 - 4th Sunday of Advent

What is the Advent Liturgical Colors?

- Bluish Purple. It symbolizes Humility, Penance, Royalty, Sacrifice, sorrow for our sins.
- Rose on the 3rd Sunday for Joy/Rejoicing on Gaudete Sunday, imminent birth of Jesus.

How do we get ready, prepare, how do we wait without giving up hope and without being distracted?

• How did Israel prepare for the Messiah?

There were many people in the Old Testament that were not ready for Jesus (Inn keepers who denied a place for Mary and Joseph), Herod, The scholars of the law (Pharisees and Sadducees). Some were ready for example (Mary and Joseph, the Magi, the Shepherds).

- How do we prepare to receive the Jesus in the Eucharist today?
- How do we stay vigilant for the 2nd coming at our Death and Judgement, so we are ready to join Christ in His heavenly Kingdom?

Confession – "Repent/Change the kingdom of God is at hand," It is time to pursue deeper conversion by receiving God's Mercy in the sacrament of reconciliation. Going to Confession is strongly recommended during advent. Jesus tells us to stay awake, remain vigilant, and to not fall asleep spiritually and to not be caught off guard.

Holy Mass/Eucharistic Adoration/Prayer – Ideal time to attend Mass and Eucharistic Adoration more frequently. Attend our first Rorate Caeli Mass on Friday 12/20 at 7 p.m..

Reflect on the Joyful mysteries of the rosary to increase the following fruits of the Spirit:

- The Annunciation Humility
- The Visitation Charity towards Neighbor
- The Nativity Poverty of Spirit and Detachment from Material Things
- Presentation of Jesus in the Temple Obedience
- Finding the Child Jesus in the Temple Joy in Finding Jesus

Simplify your life, slow down your pace, remove obstacles in your life that cause Sin and Temptation

Contemplate/Reflect on the Word of God and Quiet your Soul, Listen for God's voice in the Silence.

Use Advent Journals on Gospel Reflection. Practice Lectio Divina – Means Divine Reading, a Latin Monastic practice for scripture reading and prayer. Lection (read), Mediatio (Reflect/Meditate), Oratio (Pray/Respond), Contemplatio (Contemplate/Rest).

Church Advent Traditions - What traditions do your family participate in?

- Lighting an Advent Wreath (Church Tradition adopted in the Middle Ages)
 - It is normally in the shape of a circle to symbolize that God is eternal with no beginning nor end.
 - Decorated with holly leaves which symbolize the crown of thorns.
 - -Decorated with Evergreen which always stays green, symbolizing the unchanging, faithful nature of God and eternal life,
 - It is lit with candles symbolizing Jesus as the light of the world. The unlit candle represents the dark ages before Christ coming and the 4 weeks of Advent and 4,000 years from Adam and Eve until Jesus. Each week as more candles is lit, the light shines brighter as it gets closer to Jesus's arrival.

"I am the light of the world, whoever follows me will never walk in darkness, but will have the light of life" (John 8:12)

4 Virtues are celebrated and a new candle is lit along with a prayer is completed each Saturday or Sunday evening with the family and they are lit every evening of the week after that.

Week 1 (Purple Candle)- Hope/Prophecy Candle in remembrance of the Prophets who foretold the birth of Christ. "Therefore, the Lord himself will give you a sign: The virgin will conceive and give birth to a son, and will call him Immanuel." Isiah 7:14

Week 2 (Purple Candle) – Faith/Bethlehem Candle as we remember Mary and Joseph's journey to Bethlehem. "This will be a sign to you: You will find a baby wrapped in cloths and lying in a manager"

Week 3 (Rose Candle) – Joy (Gaudete Sunday (Latin for Joy) 1 week prior to Christmas)/Shepherds Candle to remind us of the joy that the world experienced at the birth of Jesus. "And there were shepherds living out in the field nearby keeping watch over their flocks at night. An Angel of the Lord appeared to them, and the glory of the Lord shone around them." Luke 2:8-14)

Week 4 (Purple Candle) – Peace/Angel's Candle reminding us of the message of the Angels.

"Glory to God in the highest heaven, and on Earth peace to those on whom his favor rests." Luke 2:13-24

Christmas Day/Christ Candle White –lit on Christmas and placed in the center of the wreathe. White symbolizes the purity of Christ, sinless, spotless pure Savior. Those who receive Christ as Savior are washed of their sins and made whiter than snow.

"Come now, let us settle the matter," says the Lord. "Though your sins are like scarlet, they shall be as white as snow, though they are red as crimson, they shall be like wool (Isaiah 1:18)

- Make a Jesse Tree —Received its name because the prophet Isaiah said 11:1 "But a shoot shall sprout from the stump of Jesse, and from its roots a bud shall blossom." Jesse was the Father of Kind David, and Jesus is called the Son of David in the New Testament. One ornament is added each day that symbolize the ancestors of Jesus, events and prophecies that tell the story of God through the Old Testament and using scripture verses that go along with each ornament.
- Straw in the Manger Put a straw in the manager every time a someone does a good deed to create an atmosphere of thoughtfulness, kindness. (Jesus told Saint Faustina, "I am giving you 3 ways of exercising Mercy toward your neighbor, by Deed, Word, and Prayer" Diary entry 742)
