
The Way of the Cross



Saint Paul said in his letter to the Corinthians (1 Corinthians 2:1-2), "When I came to you, brothers, proclaiming the mystery of God, I did not come with sublimity of words or of wisdom. For I resolved to know nothing while I was with you except **Jesus Christ**, and him **crucified**."

September 14th is the Feast of the Exaltation of the Holy Cross (also known as the Triumph of the Cross). Early in the 4th century St. Helena, mother of Roman Emperor Constantine, went to Jerusalem in search of the actual locations where the events of Jesus' life took place. She found the True Cross which immediately became an object of veneration for the Church. Constantine built a basilica on Calvary marking the site of the Crucifixion and dedicated it on this day in the year 335 A.D. The basilica was later destroyed by the Persians and the true cross was stolen. This day also marks the recovery of the cross by Emperor Heraclius II who returned it to Jerusalem, carrying it on his own back and restoring it to the Church in 629 A.D.

The Cross Protects us

The Sign of the cross - We do this at the beginning and ending of prayer. Also, at the beginning and ending of Mass. It represents the Trinity, (North, South, East, and West all the corners of the earth), Love, laying down your whole self. God had the Israelites mark the door posts with the blood of the lamb. We mark ourselves with the sign of the cross and we drink the blood of Christ. This protects our bodies and souls from evil. The mouth is the doorpost to our soul which is where we receive the body and blood of Christ.

We hang crucifixes in our houses. Handheld crosses and rosaries are often carried and we wear crucifixes. Sometimes they are in the shapes of swords or made to look like trees.

The Cross is the ultimate Weapon

1Corinthians 1:18 "The message of the cross is foolishness to those who are perishing, but to us who are being saved it is the **power of God**."

It is how we fight evil. Through compassion, forgiveness, nonviolence. Not with the weapons of the world or by employing strategies of worldly rulers. By laying down our life for our neighbors for Jesus.

The crucifix is so powerful it makes the devil flee and is used in exorcism and for the anointing of the sick.

"Those passing by reviled him, shaking their heads, and saying "You who would destroy the temple and rebuild it in three days, save yourself, if you are the Son of God, and come down from the cross!" Matthew 27:39-40

Also, he told Peter to get behind him Satan when he tried to rebuke Jesus after he told the disciples he must suffer. Matthew 16:23

The Cross is an instrument for peace

"For in him all the fullness was pleased to dwell, and through him to reconcile all things for him, making **peace by the blood of the cross** (through him), whether those on earth or those in heavan" - 1 Colossians 1:19-20

History on the Way of the Cross/Stations of the Cross/The Sorrowful Way

Tradition holds that our Blessed Mother visited daily the scenes of our Lord's passion. After Constantine legalized Christianity in the year 312, this pathway was marked with its important stations. St. Jerome (342-420), living in Bethlehem during the later part of his life, attested to the crowds of pilgrims from various countries who visited those holy places and followed the Way of the Cross.

St. Francis himself, inspired by a desire to evangelize, went to the Holy Land during the Fifth Crusade. It was a dangerous time to be in the Holy Land, but St. Francis desired to share the Gospel with everyone. He even managed to appear before the sultan, who was the nephew of Saladin, the original leader of the forces opposing the Crusaders. St. Francis presented the Good News of Jesus Christ to the sultan in a bold gesture of zeal; a gesture that St. Francis knew could end in martyrdom. Instead, the sultan graciously received St. Francis, and eventually, he returned home to Italy unharmed.

Francis later established a priory in Jerusalem, known as the "Custody of the Holy Land," devoted to guarding and promoting holy Christian pilgrimage sites. In 1342, because of St. Francis's connection to the Holy Land, combined with the well-known Franciscan devotion to the Passion of Christ, Pope Clement VI entrusted the care of holy sites in Jerusalem to the Franciscan Order. This meant that the Franciscans would be in charge of leading pilgrims along the Via Dolorosa, and afterwards, the stopping points along the way began to be referred to as "stations."

Thanks to the rapid, widespread growth of the Franciscans in Europe, outdoor shrines that duplicated the "stations" of the Via Dolorosa began to be erected in places where the Franciscans resided, and this is how the "Stations of the Cross" as we know them came to be. Many of these Stations were elaborate, and where these sites still exist today, you can see the exquisite, skilled work that went into creating them.

Eventually, the Stations of the Cross were also moved to the inside of Franciscan churches. In 1731, Pope Clement XII granted permission for all churches to have the Stations of the Cross, as long as they were erected by a Franciscan. At the same time, he fixed the number of Stations at 14. Then in 1857, Bishops in England were permitted to erect the Stations without a Franciscan present, and in 1862 this right was granted to the Bishops throughout the entire Church. The Stations of the Cross are now very commonly found in churches of many denominations, and especially in Roman Catholic churches.

"There is more merit to one hour of meditation on My sorrowful Passion than there is to a whole year of flagellation that draws blood; the contemplation of My painful wounds is of great profit to you, and it brings Me great joy." (St. Faustina's Diary, 369).

"My daughter, try your best to make the Stations of the Cross in this hour, provided that your duties permit it; and if you are not able to make the Stations of the Cross, then at least step into the chapel for a moment and adore, in the Blessed Sacrament, My Heart, which is full of mercy; and should you be unable to step into the chapel, immerse yourself in prayer there where you happen to be, if only for a very brief instant. I claim veneration for My mercy from every creature, but above all from you, since it is to you that I have given the most profound understanding of this mystery." (St. Faustina's Diary, 1572).
